Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment Pathway

This flow chart sets out the Autism assessment pathway for adults 18 years and older who do not have a learning disability and are concerned they may have an Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD).

Referral to the Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment Service

There are two ways you can be referred to the Adult Autism Assessment Service:

- 1) By a service provided by Oxleas NHS trust e.g. Adapt Team (Anxiety, Depression, Affective disorders, Personality disorders and Trauma), ICMP Team (Intensive Case Management for Psychosis (Schizophrenia and Bi-polar)
- 2) By your GP or another service such as MIND or Talk Together Bromley





Someone working with you, your clinician or care coordinator, will carry out a screening assessment and send it to the Adult Autism Assessment Service



The Adult Autism Assessment Service will check the referral and screening assessment



If the referral is not accepted you will receive a letter explaining why

Your case will then be closed

If you disagree with the decision you can contact the Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment to discuss further

Referral from your GP or other service such as MIND or Talk Together Bromley



Your GP or clinician from another service will refer you to Oxleas Adult Mental Health Team



You will be sent some screening questionnaires to fill in and asked to return them



Your responses on the questionnaire will be reviewed and if you score within a specific range you will be referred on to the Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment Service



If your referral is accepted by the Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment Service, you will receive a letter and you will be placed on a waiting list for assessment



If you do not score in the clinical range you will not be referred to the Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment Service and you will receive a letter explaining this

Your case will then be closed

If you disagree with the decision you can contact the Oxleas Adult Autism Assessment to discuss further

You will be contacted a few weeks in advance of your assessment by letter

The Assessment Team:

Psychologist
Occupational Therapist
Speech and Language Therapist

You will be allocated a clinician who will undertake your assessment. You may also meet with other members of the team as part of your assessment











- Sometimes assessments are offered at Queens Mary's Hospital, Sidcup.



- You may be asked to bring a parent or informant (someone who knows you well).
- They will talk to you about your history and it might be useful to bring any old reports or paperwork that might help the discussion.



• This will be explained at the end of the meeting.

The Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule (ADOS) assessment is a face to face assessment with you and 2 clinicians.

It lasts 45 mins and involves completing some games and puzzles.

You will not be told the results of the ADOS at the end of the appointment because time is needed to score it up.

Decision making

The assessment team will agree a diagnosis based on all the information they have gained from the assessment and discussions with you.



- You will be invited to attend a face to face feedback meeting to discuss the outcome of the assessment.
- You can bring a family member or a friend with you to this meeting
- You will also get a written report that is sent later in the post.
