Have you always wanted to learn flower arranging or brush up on your French? With Age UK Bromley and Greenwich's **Community Volunteers Time Bank** you can earn a time credit for every hour you give to help an older person. It might be occasional shopping, companionship and gardening, working in the day centre, DIY or helping with other services.

You can then spend your credit by choosing from over 90 skills or going to an interest group such as for art, craft, poetry, local history or flower arranging. Over 400 people and local organisations give their time as members of the time bank across the borough unlocking our greatest resource – time. Or someone might want to use their IT or administrative skills to help the smooth running of a voluntary organisation or become a trustee or a

school governor – I could go on and on.

Said Stephen Ernault, Chairman of the group, "To think when we formed we had such a long to do list and only two years later we have achieved so much. What with the playground extension, the accessibility improvement, the new benches and now the orchard, we have made it the go-to park in the area. What we have achieved is testament to the Friends model and the commitment of our volunteers and the support received from the Council."
