

An ambitious £52m regeneration plan will help Crystal Palace Park shine and reflect its glorious Victorian history in a way that is just right for today

oseph Paxton's Crystal Palace, created for the Hyde Park Great Exhibition in 1851, before moving to its final resting place in the Park, was a wonderous engineering feat of its time. A beautiful subway linked the site with the station to help Victorians promenade with ease.

Now, the heritage of Crystal Palace Park is being restored as part of an extensive £52m regeneration plan which includes the magnificent subway. This will be a sight to behold at the top of the park, with a new glass courtyard roof creating a superb cultural events venue for neighbouring communities to enjoy; delighting the 900,000-plus annual visitors to the Park, whilst helping to grow local business.

The awe-inspiring Grade I listed dinosaurs will be returned to their former glory, carefully preserved to roam their island for years to come.

Did you know?

- The Crystal Palace Grade I listed dinosaurs were the first attempt worldwide in the 1870s to create life-sized sculptures based on latest scientific knowledge at the time.
- The Crystal Palace was destroyed by fire in 1936, but majestic red sphinxes still grace the entrance steps in the Park.
- During WWII the subway was an air raid shelter protecting 192 people sleeping or 360 standing.

Friends and Community Groups have been awarded up to £20,000 each with a £40,000 threshold per ward in this significant tribute to her late Majesty the Queen announced by the Council at the time of her Platinum Jubilee.

Queensmead Playground

A £20,000 award will be used by the Playground Regeneration Group to provide more imaginative, active and inclusive play items for younger children. Parents/carers will have space to socialise, reducing loneliness. The Group aims to raise further funds and wants to hear from residents who would like to get involved.

Richmal Crompton Fields

An orchard and sensory garden are planned by Richmal Crompton Field's Friends Group using their £2,000 plus award. A 'wellness gym' will be formed and an existing flower bed will be reinvigorated to attract pollinators.

Betts Park

Improvements to the playground such as colourful markings for play, resurfacing, trails and restoration of a well-known meeting place.

Penge Recreation Ground

Addition of a wheelchair trampoline and refurbishment of play equipment.

Beckenham Green

The Friends Group will use its £20,000 to create a woodland walk, a new planting scheme and to introduce community gardening sessions to promote physical activity and combat loneliness in the community.

First for Recycling!

Bromley is best in London with residents at the very centre of our recycling partnership

harlie and Albert have plenty to smile about for, with colleagues at Veolia, they make 82,000 waste and recycling collections on a busy day in Bromley.

That's a remarkable 1.7 million a month; a staggering 10,800 tonnes of recycling and waste a month the equivalent of the weight of 900 double decker buses! Around half of the material collected is recycling, which means Bromley collected more recycling than any other London borough. That is no mean feat, but it couldn't happen without residents playing a key part.

What happens next?

You can be sure when you recycle, it will go to the right place. Veolia works closely with the Environment Agency to ensure the recycling chain is accountable and efficient, though processing destinations may vary due to market conditions.





2.000 tonnes garden waste



1.100 tonnes plastics, cans and glass



900 tonnes paper and card



800 tonnes food

Remember: 'wash and squash' your plastics, and you can buy nets from libraries to keep box contents contained.

Reduce: Reuse: Recycle

- **Reduce** single-use plastic by remembering to carry your water bottle. Borrow equipment you do not have from the 'Library of Things' in The Glades.
- **Reuse** items by giving them to charity or use a community-sharing app. Mend rather than throw away.
- Recycle to support zero waste to landfill. Let's keep it that way!



Recycling Heroes help save our planet

Children around the borough are becoming recycling 'heroes' making their school super green, while encouraging adults at home to reuse and recycle more.

An educational programme, developed by the Council with Veolia and delivered by their outreach team, promotes waste minimisation and recycling. Bromley Council has set a target of Net Zero Carbon by 2027, by which time these early 'Key Stage 2' adopters will be in their late teens and perhaps may be inspired to become Bromley's future sustainability leaders.

What happens to my recycling?

Take one example - drinks bottles

Made to be remade

Most drinks bottles are made of PET plastic, ubiquitous in our shopping baskets, containing everything from fizzy drinks and squash to water.


PET bottles are identified by machine and human eye, baled and sent to a recycling plant. Here the bottles are washed, made into flakes, treated to be food safe and made into PET pellets which can be remade into new bottles.

This circular process can be repeated, so it is vital that plastic bottles are recycled and not put in the rubbish bin.

Check your collection days online

If your collection doesn't happen, check on progress on the Council's website and see whether there has been a delay. With 82,000 collections a day something could be missed. So, where you've put out your waste at the right time and there is no obvious delay, it's easy to report a missed collection online and the team will do their best to rectify the situation. NHS Health Check

Protect your child's health

The best way to help protect your child against polio, flu, measles, mumps and rubella is to make sure they are up to date with their routine vaccinations. If you are unsure ask your GP. www.nhs.uk/vaccinations

Update on Vaping

Vaping or e-cigarettes can be useful for adults who already smoke, as an effective way to reduce or quit smoking by helping manage nicotine cravings. To get the best out of it, make sure you're using it as much as you need to and with the right strength of nicotine in your e-liquid.

However, young people and children should be discouraged from vaping, especially if they do not smoke cigarettes. There are concerns about nicotine addiction and the unknown health effects of vapes in the young. For more information about vaping and young people and to get help to stop smoking, please visit

What to do when you are unwell

If you're not feeling well, choosing the right place to go for help can save you a lot of time and effort. There are plenty of Bromley health services that offer advice, support, and treatment if and when you need it. They're very simple to use and often available without an appointment.

Use our quick guide to help you decide what to do when you don't feel well.



When to CARE FOR YOURSELF AT HOME

Have a headache, aches and pains, cough, or runny nose? Treat these minor ailments at home. Use over-the-counter medicines (available to buy in a pharmacy or supermarket), drink plenty of water, and get some rest. If your symptoms don't go away, please seek advice rather than waiting until you are very poorly. See your pharmacist or GP (or use 111 if your practice is closed).

• Antibiotics won't help if you have a cold or flu caused by a virus.



When to visit your PHARMACIST

Pharmacists are experts in medicines who can help you with minor health concerns. See them if you have minor illnesses such as coughs, cold, hayfever, stomach upsets, headaches that won't go away, bites and stings, etc. No appointment is needed, and your pharmacist can help you with dressings, medicines and healthy living advice.

- Your pharmacist will advise if you need to see a doctor.

When to use NHS 111

If you need medical help fast and your GP surgery is closed, use NHS 111 online to get assessed and directed to the right place for you. www.111.nhs.uk If necessary, an appointment will be made for you at a local service or a telephone appointment with a clinician out of working hours.

If you cannot get online, then call 111. NHS 111 is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

When to see your GP PRACTICE TEAM

Make an appointment with your GP practice if you have persistent symptoms, chronic pain, or long-term health conditions. In your practice, you will now find a wider team of specialists and professionals working together to help and care for you. The larger practice team is designed to best manage the very busy workload and the range of health needs that people have.

Bromley practices are busy, and staff are answering calls as quickly as possible. If you need help urgently, please call and you will be triaged and treated accordingly by a local service. If it's not urgent, please use **eConsult or the NHS App** to ask questions, request prescriptions, and book appointments.

If your practice is closed and you cannot wait until it opens to be seen, then use 111.

- Use the online eConsult to tell your GP about your health concern. These are read by clinicians, and you will get a response by the end of the next working day. It's easy to use but ask your practice receptionist for help if you need it.
- Did you know there are many services you can refer yourself to including physiotherapy, maternity, minor eye care, and talking therapies? It can be quicker as you don't need to see your GP first. Information at www.selondonics.org/Bromley-self-refer
- Your GP may refer you to see your pharmacy for some common ailments.

When to go to the URGENT TREATMENT CENTRE

Use an urgent treatment centre when advised to by NHS 111. If you go there with a minor or ongoing condition that can be dealt with by your GP, pharmacist, or other community service, you may be redirected back to those services for your care. This is so urgent treatment staff can focus on treating those with more serious conditions.

- Urgent treatment staff cannot refer you to specialist services or for further tests. You will need to see your GP for this.
- There are two urgent treatment centres in Bromley, at the Princess Royal University Hospital, and Beckenham Beacon.



When to call an AMBULANCE or go to A&E

Call 999 or go straight to your nearest A&E if you or someone else is seriously ill and their life is in danger.

- A&E staff cannot refer you to specialists or arrange GP appointments.
- Worried when your child is poorly? Visit www.selondonics.org/sick-child for more information
