Electric Car Charging

Bromley is the first London Borough to conduct a trial of the new Gul-e on-street electric car charging initiative that brings convenient home charging to residents despite lack of access to a driveway. Those taking part are benefitting from charging their electric cars at home and electricity that is cheaper than public charging. This trial will be assessed next year.

More than 3000 trees have been planted around the Borough since the start of the ambitious Treemendous planting programme two years ago, when the Council committed to plant 5000 trees over four years. Moving forward

Proposed improvements to The Walnuts and West Wickham leisure centres are moving ahead to the next stage of design. Works to modernise facilities at both centres is planned to start in 2024, subject to tendering and further approval, including upgrades to gyms, swimming pools, changing rooms and cafes. The progress follows extensive engagement with residents and service users in West Wickham and Orpington earlier this year.

The Royal Charter meant no other market could be held within 6 miles on the same day. Moving to Market Square in 1933 and then to Bromley North it finally relocated to the High Street in 2012.

Don't be a victim of fly-tippers

You have a duty of care for your waste



- Always be suspicious of cold callers offering to remove your waste.
- Whether you are a resident or a business, do not give any waste to someone who is unable to prove they are a legitimate waste carrier.
- Registered waste removal companies and officials will always openly offer you proof of identification and evidence of right to removal.

- Check with the Environment Agency that your waste carrier is registered.
- Always obtain a waste transfer note as proof of the transfer to an authorised person. Failure to do so could make you liable to a Fixed Penalty Notice and/or prosecution.



Where evidence exists, we will always prosecute fly-tippers.

Meet Dean Laws and his team – he has 'accepted the challenge' to keep our Borough clean, green and safe

ean is a man with a mission. He and his investigation team go to extraordinary lengths to keep our Borough beautiful and safe.

"When we're investigating a serious fly-tip we use cameras," he explains, "but we also talk to people on site, knock on doors, visit businesses and even fingertip search rubbish sacks looking for any clues."

No stone is unturned and their forensic focus means they will use just the smallest piece of evidence to locate flytippers in the Borough.

The team covers misdemeanours from sacks left in alleyways and bulky items on the highway to fully fledged organised crime.

They thrive on tip-offs, with an emphasis on known hotspots.

Dean talks animatedly about his latest fly-tipping court case: "We viewed hundreds of hours of CCTV and conducted many interviews, building a strong case resulting in fines, a seized vehicle and a Criminal Behaviour Order which, if breached, carries a prison sentence - a first for Bromley."

"We need support from residents and businesses too," says Dean. "Please check waste carriers have the legitimate paperwork before using them."

been given the green light so far, with more than £468,000 awarded to
Friends of Parks and community groups who have applied to the Platinum
Jubilee Parks Fund. In partnership with the Council's green spaces contractor, idverde, improvements are being made to many play areas, with public gardens becoming even more beautiful to visit, whilst natural biodiversity is conserved and facilities are upgraded.

Here are just some of the amazing projects that are under way or have already been completed.

Pratts Bottom Common

New play equipment was unveiled this autumn by Friends of Pratts Bottom Common. A new climbing frame with slide, two springers and new surrounding surfacing were installed using the award to the Friends Group. Pupils from Pratts Bottom Primary school and other guests attended the unveiling. In conjunction with the school and idverde, the Friends plan to use part of their £500 contribution to establish a wildflower meadow at the playground entrance.

Petts Wood Recreation Ground

The Friends of Crofton and Sparrow Woods designed and delivered an upgraded and accessible children's play area, which includes a new basket swing and 'Me to You' swing, a toddler train, a hen and horse springer, and new wet pour surfacing to help prevent injuries and improve park drainage.

Bromley's Deputy Mayor, Councillor Keith Onslow, and Deputy Mayoress, Sara Onslow, were proud to open the newly improved children's play area.

Our Veolia teams are out in all weathers. making sure that the roads and pavements of the borough are swept and kept tidy as part of their regular service.

In recent months, additional teams have been out on the streets, removing fallen leaves from our 800 miles of pavement and the borough's 500 miles of roads. In the last year, over 2.000 tonnes of leaves have been collected, which is the equivalent of 182 double-decker London buses!

We understand that frost, ice, and snow create issues and delays for our residents, which is why

we have again stocked up with 7,000 tonnes of salt for the coming season. With a bigger stockpile than any other London borough, we will look to ensure that our dedicated gritting and clearance crews are on hand to clear snow from roads and pavements in town centres, schools and transport interchanges across the borough.

Planning a Christmas or New Year get together? Consider how you might be able to reduce single use items, by using cloth napkins instead of paper, and providing reusable and washable cutlery instead of disposable plastic.

A GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION SERVICE ALL YEAR AROUND

For only £1.15 a week (£60 for 12 months), you can join over 42,000 garden waste subscribers and receive a large 240 litre green bin.

Your bin will be collected every other week during gardening season (March to November), and monthly during the remaining winter months.

Your cuttings, trimmings and prunings will be turned into nutrient-rich compost, providing vital soil improvements to farms across the UK. A winwin for your garden and the environment! Let's work together to make our gardens clean, green and truly sustainable.

Sustainable Planting Trial for the Borough

Beginning in November 2023 and running for an initial three-year period, our new Sustainable Planting Trial sees ten carefully selected locations being planted with a range of regenerative and sustainable plants, perennials, and shrubs.

In partnership with our green spaces contractor idverde, the aim of the trial is to reduce seasonal planting costs, diversify the flora in the borough, and create biodiverse habitats and food sources for insects, birds and other animal life.

Sky Lanterns



Marking an occasion with a sky lantern? Lanterns may look pretty and come in all colours, shapes and sizes but what seems like a good idea, could be extremely dangerous.

Sky lanterns have naked flames which might be harmless floating around in the sky but where they land at random, they could have unintended disastrous consequences.

Sky lanterns, balloons or similar airborne goods could not only harm wildlife, people or the environment, the residue left behind is actually a form of littering, so you could technically be issued with an £100 Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN).

Collection Calendar

This is your recycling and waste collection calendar starting from December 2023. This is for residents living in houses only as there are different arrangements for residents in flats.

All waste and recycling must be correctly presented for collection by 7am on collection day.

All waste must be contained securely and placed within arm's reach of the pavement, but not on it.

Small electrical items. batteries and textiles **must** be placed in a separate loosely-tied bag.

Leave your recycling and waste out for collection until 5pm before you report a missed collection.



technology. Light-emitting diode, LED for short, uses less power than the old low pressure sodium lanterns.

A saving of £1million a year at current costs is being made following

the programme which also replaced 8,000 of the oldest concrete lamp columns.

Residents, pedestrians and motorists alike will benefit from more reliable energy efficient lighting that's easier to maintain and cheaper to run.

LED lighting also allows for better directional output that puts light where it's needed, minimising unnecessary light pollution.

KEEP YOUR CHILD WELL THIS WINTER

Parents often dread winter as it's the season for runny noses, fevers, and germs everywhere. It is a time when babies and children get sick more often.

Although cold weather doesn't cause colds, flu and wheezing, these viruses are more common in winter as we are in closer contact with each other due to staying indoors.

But help is at hand! A new Bromley guide for parents has been published. 'Keep your child well this winter' has lots of useful tips and advice on caring for your child. It explains when you can manage symptoms at home and when you should seek medical advice. You can find it it online at www.selondonics.org/OneBromleyCYP or pick up a copy from your health visitor or GP practice.



Simple tips to help keep your children well:

- make sure they are up to date with their routine immunisations and have their flu jab
- teach them the importance of good hygiene – especially handwashing
- cough or sneeze into a tissue, put it in the bin and always wash hands
- wrap up warm
- eat healthily and drink plenty of water.

Dr Bhumika Mittal, Bromley GP advises,

"You know your child best so trust your instincts. If they are unwell and don't have any worrying symptoms, please treat them at home. If you are worried, speak to your local pharmacist or go online to www.nhs.111 If they are not improving, speak to your GP practice.



To apply you must be 16 or over, a Bromley resident and:

- a family with school age children
- · a care leaver
- a household including someone with a disability such as dementia or mental health
- · a domestic abuse survivor
- a carer

- · a large family
- · a single income family; or
- a vulnerable household experiencing exceptional financial hardship

In addition, you must provide evidence of:

- energy arrears of more than 3 months
- rent arrears of more than 3 months
- mortgage arrears of more than 3 months
- · council tax arrears; or
- evidence of other significant financial hardship

Be Scam Aware

Bromley's Trading Standards came together with the National Team and representatives from Barclays Bank to warn passers-by how easy it is to get caught out with fake lotteries, computer scams, flashy websites and convincing patter on the telephone or at the door.

It was surprising, and concerning, that many people approached in Bromley high street claimed they knew all about scams, but there are nearly four million frauds each year in Britain, which means that many people are becoming victims of sophisticated scams.



The message is clear:

be vigilant and if something seems 'too good to be true' – then it probably is!

Spot the Scam - look out for:

- being asked for personal or financial information
- pressure to act quickly
- encouragement to be secretive
- being told to send money to someone else's bank account
- encouragement to click on links in emails
- unexpected calls from unknown phone numbers



Take Five to Stop Fraud



Stop: Take a moment to think before parting with money or information.



Challenge: Could it be fake? It's OK to reject or ignore any requests.
Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.



Protect: Contact your bank immediately if you think you are the victim of a scam and report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

Remembering

World War II veteran Peter, 102, reminisces with Bromley's Mayor - including escaping death twice in just one week!

eter Lemon took part in more than fifty flying missions during WWII with Royal Air Force No.8 Squadron. Recounting two close shaves with death, he thought someone must have been looking out for him.

As part of the Mayor's quest to share people's stories, Peter told of flying over Ethiopia and into Aden where the runway was little more than a dusty path flanked by flares at night.

Take off and landing in the Wellington bomber had been straightforward for the seven-man crew over a number of daytime reconnaissance missions, until one pitch black night in January 1943. The plane rolled over one of the lit flares and, covered in fabric, easily caught fire.

"Other crew members got out quickly, but when I looked around,

the flames were engulfing the plane. I was trapped!" Peter remembered. Realising in a split second it was 20 January, with the following day his mother's birthday, he imagined her receiving a telegram with news of his death. "The next thing I knew," said

"The angels were with me that week"

Peter, "I was outside the plane, and to this day, I don't know how!"

Peter and his crew members were grounded for a few days pending an inquiry. Another crew took a mission they would otherwise have flown.

Peter takes up the story, "Sad to say the plane blew up and all the crew were killed. I thought to myself, twice in one week – the angels were most definitely with me."

A renewed call to Government for additional funding to address acute council financial pressures was unanimously approved by Full Council

raised at the highest level following the Chancellor's recent Autumn Statement, that there simply isn't enough money left within Local Government for councils to continue providing the services their residents expect.

oncern is yet again being

An increasing number of councils are struggling financially, with a growing number already effectively declaring themselves bankrupt by issuing 'Section 114' notices. Senior Local Government officials are concerned that many more are set to follow even if they can set budgets next year, due to the worsening crisis facing the sector after that.

Although not immediately threatened with the same fate, given Bromley's higher level of reserves than many, the Council is not immune from this

unhealthy trend due to ever growing demand and inflationary pressures outstripping the necessary increase in income required to support vital services supporting Adults and Children.

Bromley Council has a longheld reputation for sound financial management, alongside delivering responsive services for residents. There are increasing concerns that this cannot continue for much longer locally, prompting a renewed call to Government, unanimously approved at a council meeting in October, for additional funding to address the acute financial pressures resulting from over 20 years of reduced funding from successive Governments since the turn of the Millennium. The Council is also asking for a multi-year settlement from Government, which would help councils plan better for the future.

Fairer Funding

Bromley's call for 'fairer funding' over many years can no longer wait. If Bromley received even the average settlement for other London Boroughs, it would equate to an additional £51million per annum for local services and that money is needed now.



"We will always manage the Council's finances as carefully as possible but we are now seeing every council in the country, ourselves included, slipping further and further towards the danger zone, with only very stark and unpalatable choices sitting in front of us as we plan ahead. Some other councils have already failed, due to their own poor decision making, but the situation is now fast becoming untenable for all. The current funding system is broken, not fit for purpose, grossly unfair across outer London in particular and is now in dire need of an urgent overhaul."

Transformation

Finding sustainable ways to preserve our heritage buildings for future generations to enjoy

rom Georgian architecture
in Chislehurst to Victorian
buildings in Bromley
High Street, our Borough has
evolved over time.

Whilst a measure of change is inevitable, it is important to preserve the heritage embodied in the buildings around us to maintain the character of our Borough for future generations. Sometimes this is best served through 'smart transformation', whereby the Council purchases or disposes of buildings to deliver public services in the most efficient way possible.

The newly opened boutique hotel, restaurant and stylish workspaces at Bromley Old Town Hall demonstrate how the beauty of an ageing building can be sensitively restored.

Once home to the Borough's Council Chambers, the building was no longer large enough for the Council's needs. The Old Town Hall's new owner preserved and enhanced the traditional features which make this building so attractive and historically significant.

Now, as the Council moves its headquarters to a purpose-built office at Churchill Court, the Civic Centre will also undergo redevelopment by a new owner, while preserving the Grade II listed former Bishop of Rochester's Palace on the site.

As the Council continues to review its property holdings, making decisions to deliver a balanced council budget, it is reassuring to know that there is a bright future for our Borough's landmark buildings beyond their initial use in Council or private ownership.
