

Rapid repairs

Fixing potholes begins with digging out the hole and now this can be done faster using a JCB 'Pothole Pro' machine. Tests in the Borough show this results in roads out of use for a shorter period, helping cut delays. Pothole repairs have been prioritised and road users should continue to report problems on the Borough's 550 miles of roads and 850 miles of pavements.

beware

Bromley is cracking down on those who drop litter with more Neighbourhood Enforcement Officers patrolling and issuing on-the-spot fixed penalty notices (FPN) where necessary. They can report promptly and arrange clearance of fly-tipping and prevent littering and dog fouling.

"Impressive family help services intervene at the right time to improve children's circumstances. Experienced and skilful practitioners confidently assess need and empower families to improve their relationships and lives." Ofsted



Rachel heads up a remarkable 'early intervention' service that listens to families and provides just what they need, when they need it.

"The most important thing is building rapport with families – the entire family, working out what they need and delivering on that," Rachel explains. "And we don't give up! We reach people in every possible way. Few families require more than one cycle of support and even fewer more than two, building self-efficacy is key," says Rachel.

"Our sessions are so varied – anything you can think of that families need we will try to provide."

Rachel is proud of her team. "We take care right from the start to make sure we recruit the right people," she says. "We ask for a lot of information, so staff must work professionally with families but with warmth, empathy, and understanding."



Young people thoughtfully supported

Lorette and Chris are two of Bromley's Senior Young People's Advisors (YPAs), whose role is to offer help and advice to young people leaving care.

"It's all about building strong relationships, getting alongside the young person and understanding where they are coming from," says Chris.

Bromley allows time and flexibility to establish a rapport with our young people," Chris adds. Lorette agrees, "It's important that caseloads are well managed to allow us time to understand young people."

Lorette says that at a recent celebration of achievement for the young people, you could 'feel the love in the room'. Anyone who meets this couple will know exactly what they mean – their passion is impressive – 'Outstanding' even.

Sensitive Social Work to gain Trust

Social workers invest time, energy and enjoyment in the children they support and they work effectively with children's families, carers, and partners to establish a caring network around each child." Ofsted



A social worker in the leaving care team, Brendan has been with Bromley for four years, joining the Council just a week before the first pandemic lockdown. "We had to be very creative about how we engaged with young people during that time," he says. "We even did 'distanced' door visits with some of the most vulnerable."

"Bromley is special," says Brendan. "It has taken the corporate parenting role to heart across the whole Council. We think what would happen in a household where family support is available and then how can we replicate that for our children who often have limited support networks.

Brendan puts much of the success down to the accessible and supportive management at Bromley. "Without that, we cannot function," he says.

e choose varieties that suit the locations we

are planting them in and also for their seasonal characteristics," says Hugh Chapman, Bromley's Arboricultural Services Manager. "Take Liquidambar for instance, one popular choice. It has lovely waxy leaves that look like maple but it's actually a sweetgum, the real joy is the colours the leaves turn in the autumn."

The Treemendous initiative will add some 5000 street trees and residents may be surprised to see "no added topsoil if possible or fertiliser, just the tree being left to its own devices to establish in the soil that it will live in for the next 70 or 80 years."

"We plant what are known as standard trees so there is an instant impact," Hugh explains. "The excavated tree pit may only be 50-60 cm deep to accommodate the root ball as tree roots spread horizontally. You'll see this if a tree unfortunately falls in a storm. That's one of the reasons why we have the bag method of watering our street trees so

water pours over the roots spreading out naturally for the best start in life."

Hugh is passionate about engaging with residents about the benefits of trees. "They are for local people to enjoy and it's great if people can get involved, watering when needed for instance, or reporting problems and hopefully signing up as a Tree Friend too."

Top for recycling



The latest recycling statistics show that Bromley, for the second year running, is London's leading recycling borough, recycling almost half of all waste produced.

Bromley residents are producing less waste and recycling more than ever. From April 2022 to March 2023, over 48% of the borough's waste was recycled or composted and waste volumes fell by 6%.

The figures confirm Bromley has sustained the improved recycling performance from the year before last, when almost 45% of waste was recycled. The remainder of the borough's waste is sent to an Energy Recovery Facility and virtually zero being sent to landfill.

To help us all recycle more and minimise waste further, a number of roadshow events have been announced, with details overleaf, where our recycling experts will be ready to answer your recycling questions and help you find ways to reduce, reuse and recycle more.

Save time and effort in the garden

Why not join more than 43,000 subscribers who receive regular garden waste collections throughout the gardening season. At £70 per year, from 1 April 2024, residents receive a 240-litre bin to conveniently recycle garden waste. We then collect it every other week from March to November and monthly from December to February.

You might like to also consider a **home composter**. To find out more or purchase your half price compost bin visit **bromley.gov.uk/homecomposting**

Temporary garden waste sites will also be open the first weekend of April to minimise queues at recycling centres. Please see next page for more information.

DIY waste at your local Reuse and Recycling Centre

As of the 31 December 2023, residents can bring a limited amount of DIY waste to our Reuse and Recycling Centres for free.

This will allow residents to recycle and dispose of a wide variety of items responsibly.

Vehicle restrictions at Waldo Road and Churchfields Road Reuse and Recycling Centres

Collection Calendar This is your recycling and waste collection calendar starting from April 2024.

This is for residents living in houses only as there are different arrangements for residents in flats. Please note particularly changes to collections in Bank Holiday weeks where typically collections will be a day later than usual.

All waste and recycling must be correctly presented for collection by 7am on collection day.

All waste must be contained securely and placed within arm's reach of the pavement, but not on it.

Small electrical items, batteries and textiles must be placed in a separate loosely-tied bag. Leave your recycling and waste out for collection until 5pm before you report a missed collection.





Top five ways to reduce your food waste and recycle more

Pay attention to 'Use-by' and 'Best before' dates. The 'Use by' date is about safety and the 'Best Before' date is about quality. Food consumed after the 'Best Before' date is still safe to eat.

Safe and Sound

Bromley Safeguarding Adults Board's Independent Chair, Teresa Bell, shares what to do when an adult may be at risk



eresa Bell is an
experienced professional
in keeping adults safe, as a
former Director of Adult Social Care
and head of voluntary organisations.
"For the past 12 years, I have been
the independent chair of Safeguarding
Adults Boards," she says, "A role I feel

privileged to hold and enjoy for the difference it makes to people's lives."

"Safeguarding adults is about watching out for those who are at risk of abuse or neglect. The importance of those who visit households, neighbours, friends and family became clearer during

the pandemic," she says. "This brought into sharp focus the need to encourage people to get in touch if they witness something concerning or need support themselves.

"It might be just a niggle," says
Teresa, "we want people to be
confident to come forward and
not be frightened to speak out.
Some people turn to hoarding as
a manifestation of their distress,"
says Teresa. "This can be caused by
life's challenges, but root causes are

often deeply hidden. The Board, in partnership with Trading Standards, produced an animation to explain the condition.

"There are also many unpaid carers, some don't recognise this description. Support is available and everyone is entitled to a Carer's Assessment which will take account of what they may need.

"Don't be afraid to reach out and ask for help," Teresa concludes. "There's no shame in asking, and no guilt in reporting something. It may be the best thing you do for someone who is suffering in silent isolation."

Self-neglect – what to look out for

Any lack of self-care in terms of personal health, hygiene and living conditions can be referred to as self-neglect



There is no single definition of self-neglect, but the Care Act places it within the statutory definition of abuse or neglect, if the person has care and support needs and is unable to protect themselves from neglect.

Individual uniqueness allows for personal choice but navigating life can be more difficult when confronted with various challenges such as bereavement, illness, trauma or disability. These can be signs of someone not coping:

- Poor hygiene
- Unkempt appearance
- Lack of food, clothing, shelter
- Neglecting the household
- Hoarding
- Collecting many animals
- Non-compliance with health services
- Inability or unwillingness to take medication

Parks and open spaces across the Borough continue to benefit from the Council's £1million Platinum Jubilee Parks Fund

Blake Recreation Ground

A challenging wooden 'trim trail' aimed at 6 to 12-year-olds and a fitness frame designed for all users to take part in a variety of strengthening exercises have been installed in the park thanks to a £20,000 award, plus a £10,000 contribution by Friends of Blake Park. The trim trail offers tightrope walks, a climbing wall, swaying ropes, a rolling log and responsive horizontal ropes. There is also a free app to download to support the use of the fitness frame kit.



Cator Park

A new dog agility course at Cator Park includes, ironically, a catwalk bridge, crawl through tunnel and jump through wall. The new 'Bark Park' is fun for dogs and enhances the bond between owner and pet.

Ravensbourne Open Space

Friends of Ravensbourne Open Space were awarded £19,000 to make the playground area more inclusive for a wider age range of children.

A new climbing frame was installed, as well as an inclusive spinner and lily pad stepping-stones.



Jubilee Country Park

A community orchard has been established on an unproductive meadow using just under £3,000 awarded to the Friends of Jubilee Country Park.



Richmal Crompton Fields

An orchard and a sensory garden have been created using a grant of £2,000 to the Friends of Richmal Crompton Fields.

Glittering Tribute

The gilded crown atop the 'Bowie Bandstand' is a fitting tribute to the structure and David Bowie's performance there

ye-catching gilding has been applied to the crown at the pinnacle of the Grade II Edwardian Bandstand, in Croydon Road Recreation Ground, affectionately known as the 'Bowie Bandstand'. A performance by glam rock icon and erstwhile Beckenham resident David Bowie in August 1969 gave rise to its colloquial name.

The £245k restoration project of the Bandstand, believed to have been erected in 1905, has returned it to its original colour scheme of dark brown and buff, with the plans also including landscaping improvements and a pathway of personalised bricks.

Funding for the project was secured from a variety of sources, including

more than £100,000 from community fundraising including festivals organised by Bowie's Beckenham Oddity, £80,000 from Bromley Council and £12,840 from Heritage of London Trust whose additional support allowed for the crown – corona – to be gilded by specialists AF Starr Limited.

Once completed, the Bandstand will host performances and perhaps once again pay witness to another future superstar.

Residents are encouraged to make sure they and their children have had routine Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccines, especially in light of concern about the increase in measles cases across the country. Dr Nada Lemic, Director of Public Health in Bromley said, "MMR vaccines are the most effective way to protect our children and ourselves from serious illness and health complications from measles, and to lower the risk of an outbreak."

Is your child up to date?

The first dose of MMR is due at one year of age and a second dose from eighteen months. You should be notified when your child is eligible, but check their Red Book (Personal Child Health Record) if you're unsure. It's never too late to catch up. For children 1-5 years, contact your GP for an appointment.

Bromley, like all local authorities, continues to face unprecedented financial challenges, so to help protect services, all options for reducing costs and generating income are being explored

he rising cost and demand for both adult and children's social care, and housing are driving our financial challenges.

But much has already been achieved through the Council's award-winning transformation programme through identifying the most effective methods of service delivery and seeking further efficiencies in service supply and procurement. This ongoing work has led to over £102 million in transformation and other savings over the first four years to reduce the Council's cost and growth pressures.

Alongside the multi-million costsaving move into a new civic centre at Churchill Court, the Council is looking at its buildings to make long-term decisions on their use to best deliver services and protect finances.

Some savings simply come from delivering council services effectively, such as our hard-won title of 'London's top recycler', which helps cut costs and minimise waste - all with the help of residents. Also, the conversion of the Borough's 28,000 street lamps to LED is saving at least £1 million every year.

Generating income is also key, with various opportunities sought to boost income streams and careful investment decisions expected to generate around £18 million in 2024/2025, which represents 7 per cent of the Council's controllable budget.

The glorious arrival of a new baby could be marred by feelings of isolation and loneliness. Don't 'keep mum'

attie was 'going through the motions' by the time she got to Mindful Mums, a support group helping mothers through the trials and tribulations of having a new baby.

Eight months pregnant when a house move fell through, Hattie's long-awaited baby, helped by fertility treatment delayed by the pandemic, became part of a nomadic family moving from place to place.

Now, happily settled and with a sister to Arthur, two, Hattie is thankful she stepped into South East London Mind's Mindful Mums. "Caring for a baby is hard enough without constantly moving – I didn't have a local support network," said Hattie. "Mindful Mums instantly felt

different. Friendly volunteers shared experiences over comforting cups of tea. It felt like a safe place to open up.

"As I told my story to a room full of mums, I noticed one was crying." said Hattie. "Hopefully my openness spurred others on, but everyone shared. Over five weeks we covered so much, with honesty and candour.

I can still rely on support and advice through the WhatsApp group we formed."

"New mums, please spend time looking after yourself and reach out for support – don't feel guilty about that."

Seek support

There is such joy in having a baby but with the pressures of night time feeds, the changes in identity and relationships, is it any wonder that some mums feel a little lost and sometimes just a bit lonely? Mindful Mums founder Karen Taylor, who experienced this first hand, said: "I wanted to ensure people didn't feel alone and help build resilience to tackle the everyday issues of having a new baby."
